BRIDGEFORD, East 662 <i>Tho. Beaumont, offi^e min^r.</i>		None.	Five day schools, containing 64 boys and 36 girls; and a Sunday school, consisting of 40 children.	The poor cannot afford to educate their children, and would be glad of the means.
BRIDGEFORD, West 210 containing Gampston chapelry - 116 <i>Levitt Thoroton.</i>		Mr. Thompson, the late rector of the parish, has left 30 <i>l.</i> to establish a school, at the death of Mrs. T. whose age is about 90.	None.	The poorer classes of West Bridgeford are without the means of education; but it is thought, when the money left by the late rector becomes available, it will be sufficient for that purpose.
BROUGHTON Sulney, 278 <i>John Wilson, curate.</i>		None.	A boarding and day school for young gentlemen. A village day school, and one taught by a mistress, containing together 50 children.	Some of the poor have not sufficient means of education, and are desirous of possessing them.
BULWELL - - - 1,944 <i>W^m Herbert.</i>		One school, in which 8 children are taught. The master's salary is 16 <i>l.</i> per annum, with a small house. Some abuses of funds are reported to exist in this parish.	A day school for boys, and two for girls, containing 150 children.	The poorer classes have not sufficient means of education, and are desirous of possessing them.
BUNNY - - - - 374 <i>W. B. Cocker, vicar.</i>		A school, in which 130 children are taught. The master's salary is 35 <i>l.</i> per annum, arising from the rent of thirty-three acres of land, which owing to the terms of endowment in 1707 was not to be raised, and the master was to have a fixed money payment.	One school for very young children, containing from 12 to 20, who are instructed in reading, in order to qualify them for admittance into the endowed school.	The poorer classes are not without sufficient means of education.
BURTON Joyce - - 459 containing Balcote hamlet - - 105 <i>Tho^s Adin, curate.</i>		None.	Two Church Sunday schools, supported by subscription, consisting of 62 children; and three small day schools, in which about 65 are taught.	The poor are without any means of educating their children, and would be glad of any assistance that could be afforded them.
BURTON, West - - 19 <i>Geo^s Morton, curate.</i>		Two acres of land in the parish of Sturton, were left by will for the education of 3 children belonging to this parish. The said land is now let for 1 <i>l.</i> 19 <i>s.</i> 6 <i>d.</i> per annum; and whenever there are children in the parish of age to be sent to school, they are admitted to one established at Sturton; at present there are only 2 children old enough to attend.	None.	
CALVERTON - - 904 <i>John Isen.</i>		A school, in which 2 or 3 children are taught, and frequently none. The funds possessed are a house and garden, with about 6 <i>l.</i> per annum. The minister is unable to state the master's salary, and he supposes the charity to be abused.	Two schools for boys and girls, consisting of about 80; and two Sunday schools, one belonging to the Established Church, containing 120, and one to the Methodists of 130.	Many of the poor have not the means of educating their children, and are desirous of possessing them.
CARCOLSTON - - 167 <i>William Key, vicar.</i>		None.	A school, at which 12 children are taught by a mistress.	Several of the poor are without sufficient means of education, and would be glad to possess them; and a school has been lately discontinued.
CARLTON in Lindrick, 631 <i>R. P. Goodenough, rector.</i>		A school-room, and two acres of land, the rent of which is not applied to the purpose intended.	Three schools, to which the rector subscribes 10 guineas per annum, containing about 120 children.	The poorer classes are desirous of possessing more sufficient means of education.
